



COVID-19 - WORKPLACE RISK ASSESSMENT

COVID-19 is a new illness that can affect your lungs and airways. It is caused by a virus called Coronavirus. Symptoms can be mild, moderate, severe, or fatal.

This is a **generic Risk Assessment** for dealing with the current COVID-19 situation in the workplace. It is not likely to cover all scenarios each service should consider their own unique circumstances. Much more specific assessments, such as that for support staff and SU's, may look quite different although many of the principles would still be relevant.
